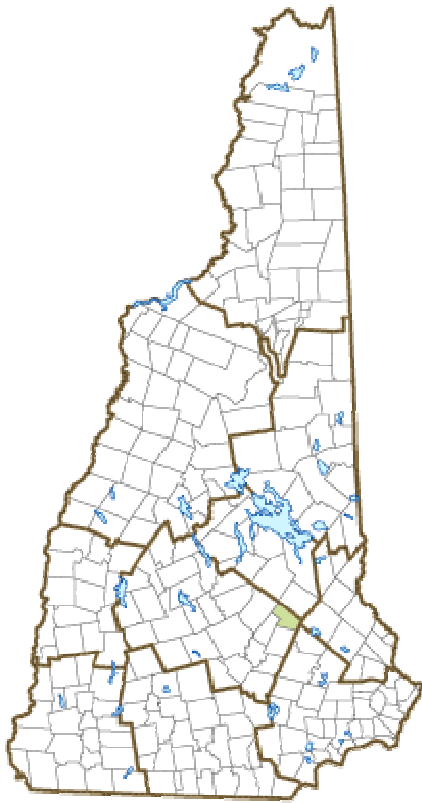

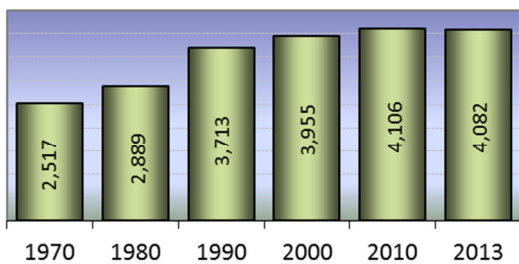

**Incorporated:** 1782

**Origin:** For many years, this territory was the unnamed northern parish of Chichester. In 1782, John Cram, William Chase, and Jonathan Leavitt Jr. petitioned the legislature on behalf of residents for incorporation of a parish separate from Chichester. The petition was granted in March 1782. Like Pittsburg in the north, Pittsfield was named for William Pitt, Prime Minister of England, and a great friend of the Colonies prior to the American Revolution, who had died in 1778. Pittsfield was home to Hiram Americanus Tuttle, Governor of New Hampshire, 1891-1893.

**Villages and Place Names:** Rings Corner, Webster Mills, South Pittsfield

**Population, Year of the First Census Taken:** 888 residents in 1790



**Population Trends:** Population change for Pittsfield totaled 1,663 over 53 years, from 2,419 in 1960 to 4,082 in 2013. The largest decennial percent change was a 29 percent increase between 1980 and 1990, accounting for half of the total numeric increase. The 2013 Census estimate for Pittsfield was 4,082 residents, which ranked 91st among New Hampshire's incorporated cities and towns.

**Population Density and Land Area, 2013 (US Census Bureau):** 169.2 persons per square mile of land area. Pittsfield contains 24.1 square miles of land area and 0.2 square miles of inland water area.
